CINDERELLA FAMILY DAY: MAKE A ROYAL CROWN

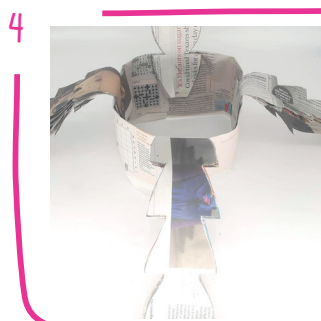
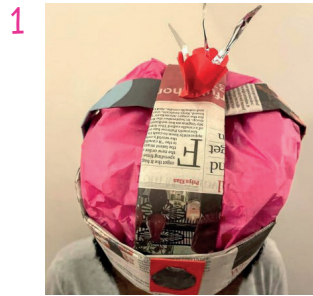
The artist and designer Edward Burne-Jones created a series of tiles telling the story of Cinderella. We've put them all together with captions on the following pages. Use the tiles to help you create your own Cinderella play, pantomime or story - use this crown as a prop!

You will need

- * Scissors, glue stick, stapler/tape, colouring pencils/felt tips/crayons
- * Six large sheets of newspaper or cardboard like a cereal packet or packaging
- * A4 coloured or white paper, tin foil, sweet wrappers or shiny paper, pompoms, coloured tissue paper

Step by step instructions

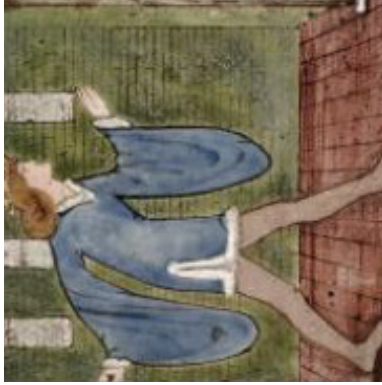
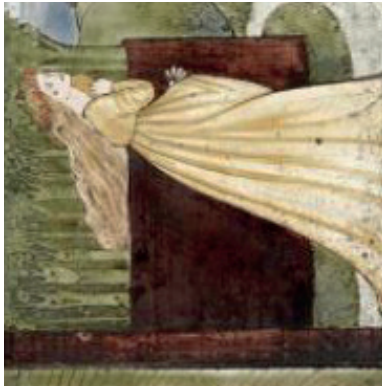
1. Take two newspaper broadsheets and fold them to make the two crown headbands. These need to be strong so fold each one approximately four times. Glue down open edges. This strip will become the headband so make sure it fits round your head. If you're using card, cut a wide strip to fit your head too.
2. Make four smaller-width strips. Take four broad sheets and fold each sheet six times. Glue down any loose edges. Fold all four strips to be half the length of the head band. These four smaller strips will become the crown's 'arch'. Keep the headband and the arches flat for now. It will be much easier to decorate this way. You will put them together at the end.
3. Decide what you would like on the head band and on the arches.
 - a. Use a paper stencil to create an interesting shape for each arch and draw around it on each arch strip.
 - b. Embellish, draw, paint or collage: stick on coloured paper or paint the arches a background colour, cut out 'royal' shapes and cover with foil, stick on ribbons, buttons, 'gems' from scrunched up sweet wrappers...
 - c. Try foil embossing: glue string in a pattern to your band or arches, then glue over the string pattern. Press foil over the strip, pressing firmly to show an embossed effect
4. Check the length of your crown and staple the band to fit your head. Staple the base of each arch evenly around the crown band. Stick or tape the tips of the band together in the middle of the crown band
5. You can add a paper 'globe' or ball and glue/tape it in place on the top of the crown. Add a cap to the inside of the crown using coloured tissue or wrapping paper.
